The Story Behind Our Cover Photo



Our cover photo features St. Joseph Worker, Cindy Emenalo, as she waters the spring garden at her community house, where she lives in intentional community with other Workers. At St. Joseph Worker of Orange, Workers respond to the needs of the time by working in their community and living by four core values of Spirituality, Community/Simplicity, Leadership, and Justice. Led by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange and their Laudato Si' seven goal action plan, Cindy and her fellow community answered the call of ecological and social justice by challenging themselves to live sustainably and be socially responsible. Inspired by the action plan's focus on water sustainability and practicing stewardship, St. Joseph Workers created two projects. One was to cultivate a spring garden. The other was to launch a Multicultural Mission Project. Cindy was instrumental in the Multicultural Mission Project and in helping to cultivate the

garden where she learned how to tend to the garden, grow spring vegetables and herbs like basil, sage, and thyme and harvest the crops, like oranges, papayas, and guavas.

As Cindy shared:

The Multicultural Mission project (a webinar series I created focused on education and awareness of various cultural racial issues in the community) arose out of a series of conversations that I had with one of my fellow SJWs. We deeply discussed the tragic series of events in 2020* and the need for diversity, equity, and inclusion. From there we decided that we wanted to create a platform to allow leaders from different cultural groups to speak about the social justice issues that affect their communities. From this came impactful stories, new connections between communities and organizations, and greater awareness about how injustice affects the dear neighbor. For me, this did not connect at first with the work I did for the SJWP Garden Project. Each day, as I watered the plants, they grew larger and stronger. One day I looked out and saw a diverse ecosystem of flora blossoming amongst each other. I realized that just as I watered seeds of kale, tomatoes, and sunflowers in the garden, I also watered the seeds of community through the Multicultural Mission. The greatest lesson I learned is that it is necessary to continue tending our gardens and protecting our Earth in order to maintain the beautiful biodiversity, just as we need to continue having important conversations and creating opportunities for communities that have been historically underserved. I always think of the quote: "Love thy neighbor as thy self", because after all, we all belong to one another.

* Following the 2020 police murder of Minneapolis man George Floyd, many programs within Catholic Volunteer Network dove into a deeper learning about anti-racism, making commitments to honoring Black lives through exploring ways to center service in racial justice, inclusion, and equity.

Narrow down your options

Now that you've considered all your options, it's time to narrow it down to your top programs. Our member programs' application processes typically have several different stages spread out over a few months. We recommend keeping track of all the deadlines in a planner or your phone to ensure you don't miss any important steps. Also, since each application process is different, we recommend applying to two, maybe three programs. If at some point during the application process you decide that a program isn't quite right for you, be sure to share that with the program staff person you've been in touch with. They may even be able to help you identify a different program that is a better fit.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: A Simple House missionaries live radically Christian lives in voluntary poverty and in service to the poor. Our missionaries go out in pairs to the poorest neighborhoods of our cities to meet the poor in their own homes and homeless camps. Friendship evangelization is the method we use to spread the Gospel. Our missionaries bring the Good News to the poor in new and creative ways. We help the poor carry their burdens and accompany them in their efforts to improve their lives and grow closer to Christ. Missionaries manage a monthly budget of a few thousand dollars and decide how the money will be used to serve the poor. The core of the ministry is love and friendship. A Simple House is a place to respond to the biblical call to give to the poor and follow Jesus. Our missionaries are given the special opportunity to radically dedicate themselves to spiritual growth while living in community with others trying to do the same.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Our missionaries do not just feed the poor. They eat with the poor. Missionaries do not just visit poor neighborhoods. They live in poor

neighborhoods and visit the poor in their own living rooms and homeless camps. Each person is met, listened to, and loved. We strive to meet the spiritual and material needs of the lonely and outcast of the inner-city in the context of a unique friendship. Missionaries live a simple lifestyle in community without Wi-Fi, television, or air-conditioning. In 2024, we are instituting a phone detox by providing flip-phones. Other forms of distraction are limited to allow missionaries to concentrate on prayer, Scripture, and fellowship. Silence is observed in the houses until 9:20 am to allow for personal prayer. Missionaries attend daily Mass and pray morning and evening prayer from Liturgy of the Hours. Missionaries are challenged to grow in holiness and continue to pursue a deeper personal faith.

SERVICE AREA: Washington, DC and Kansas City, MO.

SERVICE LENGTH: Missionaries make an initial commitment of 10 months (Mid-August through May 31). Approximately half of our missionaries stay for a second year or more.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: Aid for Women helps thousands of women each year in the Chicago

metropolitan area who find themselves facing unexpected pregnancies. Each woman is provided with the emotional, practical and spiritual support that she needs to choose life for her unborn baby and to provide a better future for her and her child.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: AT OUR PREGNANCY CARE CENTERS: Front Desk Greeters assist staff with client intake process. One-on-One Parenting Session Instructors help clients gain valuable knowledge about pregnancy, childbirth, parenting and life-skills. Moms-to-Be Support Group Volunteers assist staff with welcoming clients and facilitating our monthly Moms-to-Be Support Groups. AT OUR RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS: Vitae Corps Member live and work in community at our residential programs to help provide our residents with safe and nurturing homes. Life Skills Volunteers present to residents on topics of “Body, Mind and Soul” — such as health, nutrition, exercise, baby care, parenting, job search techniques, resume writing, financial planning, music, art, spiritual growth and more! Community Dinner Volunteers donate and deliver a prepared meal for our residents and children.

SERVICE LENGTH: Typically, Vitae Corps members volunteer for one year, but length of service may vary.

Pregnancy center volunteers serve based on need and length of service varies.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: Notre Dame's ACE Teaching Fellows Program forms passionate college graduates to serve as full-time teachers in underserved Catholic elementary, middle, and high school classrooms across the country. Over the course of two summers and two academic years, our teaching fellows earn a cost-free Master of Education degree from the University of Notre Dame, professional training and experience in the field, as well as, state licensure. Our teachers live in intentional communities of 4-8 members and have ample opportunities for spiritual development, coaching, and mentorship outside of the classroom.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Two years of teaching in an underserved Catholic school. Placements are at the elementary, middle, and high school level. Our teachers spend two summers at the University of Notre Dame, earning a Master of Education degree.

Fellows are transformed through faith-based social justice programming, purposeful community living, and direct, full-time professional experience with Chicago area non-profits. Our mission is create life-long social justice advocates.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: With a network of over fifty Chicago area non-profits, Amate House works diligently to place fellows in professional jobs geared toward their skills and interests, including positions at legal aid centers, low-income community health clinics, schools, parishes, and social service organizations.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: André House is a ministry of hospitality, which combines the gifts of many people to pursue community in the

body of Christ reflective of the Reign of God. We blend traditions of the Catholic Worker and the Congregation of Holy Cross. We are dedicated to serving those experiencing homelessness and poverty by living and working among them. In serving and welcoming we strive to foster peace in an alienated world. André House intends to serve people who are poor through its capacities to provide food, shelter, clothing, companionship and other services, while recognizing other's freedom to accept these. We lead though with hospitality in walking with those who come to us, we are able to address their needs. In serving people who are poor, we seek to learn from them. We strive to say with our actions: "Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven."

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Andre House's Core Team typically consists of 6 dedicated team members who live in community together in a house in the nearby neighborhood to our soup kitchen where they serve. Core Team members coordinate and deliver the services of the evening meal, clothing, showers, laundry, porter, office and other guests services. A typical day involves a trip to the food bank, Mass, a brief morning meeting, a morning clothing/laundry/office/porter shift, lunch, an afternoon showers/laundry/office/porter shift, and coordinating and being present to our guests and volunteers during our evening meal service that serves 400+ guests. Core Team members

have the opportunity to forge relationship with and be present to our dear homeless guests as well as volunteers, our Administrative leadership and Holy Cross priests/brothers each and every day. Core Team members have the chance to work hard and to be in solidarity with our most marginalized friends in Central Phoenix.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: To provide an experience of service, accompaniment and solidarity with the poor in the border communities of El Paso, Texas and Juarez, Mexico. The work is focused to responding to the undocumented, immigrants, and refugees. The ministry consists in the sharing of one's life through the operation of several houses of hospitality; advocacy on behalf of the poor in migration; and awareness and immersion experiences. The hospitality offered in several large houses includes everything from food, shelter, clothing and social needs to networking with immigration asylum counselors and lawyers. Annunciation House is sustained by

individual contributions and donations, and by an all-volunteer staff. For the volunteers, service at Annunciation House is a way of being and living at a particular time in one's life. The work is your life and the living is your work. It is important for volunteers to realize that there must be an openness to doing whatever there is to be done and serving wherever one is needed.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Hospitality shelter staff, social services, work with immigrants and refugees (largely people from Mexico and some Central and South Americans), border education and research, office and computer work, accounting and bookkeeping, building maintenance.

SERVICE AREA: El Paso, TX and Juarez, Mexico

SERVICE LENGTH: One year or longer preferred; may consider six-month-plus arrangements on a case-by-case basis. There is also a ten-week summer program.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: Assumption Mission Associates (AMA) is a ministry of young adults in collaboration with the Religious of the Assumption Sisters in their mission to effect change in society through

prayer, education, and community building. With the Assumption spirit, the AMA volunteers bear witness to Jesus' love for all people. The relationships that they cultivate transform them as well as the people they accompany. They exercise their commitment to service in solidarity and communion, in faith and in trust.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Whether you want to serve domestically we have many programs to be involved in - as an ESL teacher in a middle school or help with refugees, legal assistance, or youth ministry in Chaparral, NM. Or adult ESL, food insecurity, or an after-school program for inner-city children at a large parish in Worcester, MA.

Internationally, many community development projects in the Philippines, or children after school projects in the U.K. Whether you are a recent college graduate or a young professional dissatisfied with the workplace and looking for more meaning in your life, your primary role as an AMA will be to empower the poor, the young and the marginalized. Accompanying the under-served, AMAs discover who they really are and how their faith is deeply a part of them.

GOAL OF PROGRAM: Bethlehem Farm is a Catholic community in Appalachia that transforms lives through service with the local community and the teaching of sustainable practices. We invite volunteers to join us in living the Gospel cornerstones of service, prayer, simplicity, and community.

TYPE OF PLACEMENT: Caretaker: live in intentional Christian community year-round and provide service-retreats for youth and adults through community service (primarily low-income home repair, and also including organic farming).

Caretakers live out the four cornerstones of prayer, community, simplicity, and service as members of the Summers, Monroe and Greenbrier county communities, while also fulfilling the various administrative roles that keep the nonprofit going. Opportunities include rural Appalachian ministry, construction, home repair, retreat planning, youth ministry, office management, hospitality, gardening, environmental activism, and

community building. Summer Servant: live with the Caretaker community to participate in community life, help with daily chores, and contribute to group week activities for 2 weeks-3 months from April-October. Service-Week Participant: A week-long service retreat experience provided by volunteer Caretakers is available for teens, college students, adults, and families.

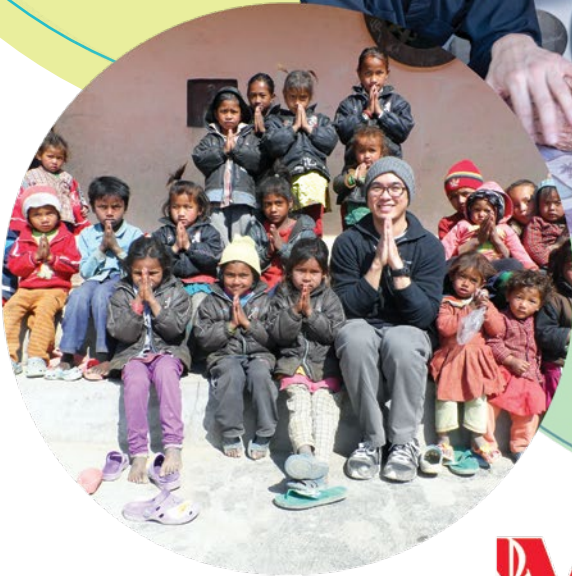
