RECOMMENDATIONS FOR RECRUITMENT

CAMPUS RECRUITMENT

- Recruit at state colleges
- Recruitment at one of the 100 Historically Black Colleges in USA
- Utilize people of color in recruitment
- Contact the student organizations (i.e. Black Student Union, Asian Student Union, etc)
- Begin to develop relationships with college mentors
- Utilize alumni from the school

RECRUITMENT LITERATURE

- Use pictures which show people of color
- Use words if can't get pictures
- Utilize artwork from various cultures in brochures
- Be mindful that certain colors or art designs used will appeal to certain ethnic groups (red/green/black: Colors of African American Flag)



- **▼ RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN DIRECTOR AND POTENTIAL VOLUNTEER IS MOST IMPORTANT!**
- ▼ Interpersonal relationship/communication assumes the recognition/value of person
- Acknowledge the importance of the family in making decisions

ADVERTISING

- Local newspapers and magazines
- Newsletter that targets certain ethnic groups: IN THE WORD (Black Catholics) NUESTRA PARROQUIA (Hispanic/Latino)

- 4. Do the pictures I have in my brochure reflect attentiveness to cultural diversity?
- 5. Is most of the recruitment done with written correspondence?
- 6. Do I respond to inquiries by letter, phone and/or visit?
- 7. Do I recruit in predominately white/Anglo communities, colleges, parishes, etc?
- 8. How do I show an interest in the prospective volunteer?
- 9. How do I state the benefits of volunteer service?
- 10. Do I advertise in newspapers, newsletters, etc. that would be read by a predominately white/Anglo audience?
- 11.Do I invite people of color to be part of the recruitment, formation, training, and decision making process? If so, do I ask for their suggestions and comments regarding recruitment?
- 12. Do I try to recruit in areas where I have placed a volunteer?
